### **Sustainability Term**

As I said last week, this term there are many national theme weeks and days, such as World Book Day, Waste Week, Science Week, which all have sustainability as the theme. Our main focus is on reusing items, which is why we are asking for pre-loved books, dressing up costumes and toys.



#### **Books**

We are going to open an outdoor library, where the children can choose and take pre-loved books home and drop off books they have read and no longer want. We ask that the children continue to bring in books they no longer want to take part in the launch of our pre-loved book library.

#### **World Book Day Costumes**

When you child grows out of any of their dressing up costumes, and you do not have younger children who would benefit from them, please bring to the school office. We will store them and before the next World Book Day, we will put them out so that children can choose a new costume.



#### Toys

If your child has any toys they no longer use, please get them to have a sort out and bring them into school. We will organise a toy swap in the forthcoming weeks.

By doing this our aim will be to try to get across the idea of recycling as part of the circular economy, rather than the extract, make, use, dump economy. The campaign sums it up as: If some books or toys are not traded, children will need to take them home. Parents can then decide whether to 'pop' them to a charity shop or keep them. Let's swap, pop and not shop to care for the environment!

The code we used for the strike, does not affect their overall absence percentage, as it is not counted as a possible attendance. *If your child's class is open and your child does not attend, their absence will be recorded following normal procedures.*

#### **Volunteers:**


